# You Are Making a Difference

Every day along the border, citizen Soldiers and Airmen guarding the border experience a wide range of activity. Some service members encounter hundreds of illegal crossings each day, and others chase them down through cactus and brush. But an increasing number of service members see limited activity each day. The lack of activity may lead one to ask how they can possibly be effective.

"The work each of our service members is doing is very important." said Maj. Gen. Tracy Norris, Texas Adjutant General. "Their presence along the border creates a significant deterrence to criminal activity along our southern border." Citizens along the border have noted a significant drop in illegal activity on their property, they identify the change as a direct result of Texas Service Members standing guard and the installation of temporary fences redirecting traffic. "Before the military arrived, we found drugs,

cocaine, guns, and a dead body with a machete down his head." said Magali Rodriguez-Urbina, a property owner in Eagle Pass. "The National Guard came in and they're building us this beautiful fence." she added. The additional security presence acts as a deterrent and redirects illegal traffic toward the locations where Border Patrol can better control the situation. "Definitely a lot more security," said Rodriguez-Urbina. "We don't see too much of the bad guys, I believe because of the fence." This sentiment is common among Texas citizens. A lack of activity in some areas actually reflects an effective strategy "When they're gone, this is going to help Border Patrol," said Rodriguez-Urbina speaking of the temporary fence.

"If they're going to cross here, they're going to have to walk a certain way – they're not going to run out into the orchard the way they used to. Border Patrol would just have to scatter all over." With the fence diversion, Border Patrol will continue to improve effectiveness across the border. "I am much safer," said **Rodriguez-Urbina.** "I feel safe."





On warm winter days, as traffic swells at rush hour along the Texas-Mexico border, Laredo residents typically pack shopping centers and gas stations. Just outside the entrance to one of the biggest grocery stores in town lies multiple beaten dirt paths leading into the busy parking lot. The crude walkways are lined with fresh footprints, dozens of articles of throwaway clothing, and bent-over fencing. Only a stone's throw from the beginning of these



walkways is a shallow portion of the Rio Grande. It is here where Operation Lone Star's Texas Army National Guardsmen encounter hundreds, if not thousands, of illegal border crossings each month. When the sun goes down, illegal crossings in the area increase. "The shallow river makes it easy to cross into Texas illegally," said a platoon leader. "The crossing points are a short distance from Laredo neighborhoods, making it easy for the migrants to get into getaway vehicles." Night and day, Soldiers work alongside the Texas Department of Public Safety troopers and other law enforcement partners to deter and interdict those attempting to illegally cross the Rio Grande into Texas. These law enforcement officials and troops synchronize dozens of roaming patrols, advanced-optics observation points and communication systems all into one combined purpose.


# **COMMANDER'S CORNER**

Early voting for the March 1, 2022 Primary Election is now underway.


