Sgt. Maj. Juli Blenis: A Steady Hand Behind the Command

It is early on a Saturday morning. The sun has yet to dawn over drill weekend at the Camp Mabry headquarters of the Texas State Guard. Juli Blenis isn't waiting around for the sun — or the first cups of coffee. A commanding voice rises across the workspace calling half the building to attention without the aid of amplification: the voice of an experienced sergeant major who has seen it all.

"Who's parked in the general's space again? Get that thing moved right now! We've got a presentation in 30 minutes! Get those flags up here!"

With decades of distinguished service and a career that bridges military excellence and public-sector leadership, Sgt. Maj. Juli Blenis is the organizational force behind the Texas State Guard's highest echelons. As executive assistant to the TXSG Command Group, she manages the daily flow of information and operations at TXSG headquarters — ensuring the state's Guard force remains mission-ready and well-coordinated.

Behind the familiar voice of the sergeant major is the mental agility of a would-be lawyer with a passion for history, a respect for structure and discipline, and an institutional knowledge that few current Guard members can parallel. She holds a Bachelor of Science from Excelsior College, University of the State of New York, and previously held a top-secret security clearance.

Her expertise is hard-earned. A U.S. Army veteran with decades of active-duty service, Blenis held multiple senior administrative leadership roles, including support operations during Operation Desert Storm. At VII Corps, she managed the secure flow of classified battlefield information and coordinated the deployment of more than \$35 million in equipment to Southwest Asia. Later, as a senior administrator for the Family Support Division at Fort Hood, she streamlined technology transitions and arranged high-profile visits from senior Army leaders and dignitaries. Her military career earned her multiple commendations, including two Meritorious Service Medals, six Army Commendation Medals, and recognition for excellence in total quality management.

When Blenis entered the Army on active duty, just over three percent of the force was female.

"I was an Illinois State Scholar (before delayed entry to the U.S. Army) and just wanted to pay my student loans off," she explains. With more than 170 hours of education at the university level, she had her sights set on a legal education. "I love the law. I was planning on getting out and going to law school ..." but as often happens, life got in the way: a marriage, family, travel around the U.S. and the world.

That's not to say life hasn't been sweet. She speaks proudly of the accomplishments of her three grown children, Paul, Philip and Mary.

Force Multipliers: Generals Muirhead and Thomas Appointed to Top Posts in the Texas State Guard

Camp Mabry (Austin), TX - The Texas State Guard has appointed two new Deputy Commanding Generals, promoting Brigadier Generals Stephen Thomas and John Muirhead in February 2025. The appointments come as the Guard continues to align its leadership with evolving state missions under Maj. Gen. Roger Sheridan (recently appointed Commanding General of the Texas State Guard).

Brig. Gen. Stephen Thomas now serves as Deputy Commanding General for Support. Commissioned in 1981 through ROTC at the University of Texas at Austin, he served in the Army Reserve before joining the Texas State Guard in 2011. Over the next decade, Thomas took on roles ranging from battalion commander to Director of Plans, Operations, and Training. He was promoted to Brigadier General in February 2025. Outside the military, Thomas has served 25 years in state government in a variety of top-level positions including as agency chief executive, deputy agency director, CAO, CFO and CHRO. His career includes leadership roles in the healthcare industry, and public service as a local elected official (including 15 years on the Cedar Park City Council). He is also the CEO of a family-owned business and a former adjunct professor of management.

Brig. Gen. John Muirhead, appointed Deputy Commanding General for Operations, brings an extensive background in special operations, intelligence, and psychological operations. A veteran of multiple combat deployments, Muirhead retired from the U.S. Air Force after 20 years of active duty, then transitioned into law enforcement and national defense consulting. He joined the Texas State Guard after retirement, where he has served as a regiment commander, brigade deputy, and Inspector General. He holds advanced degrees in strategic intelligence and education and is currently pursuing a PhD in history.

Together, Generals Thomas and Muirhead bring a combined legacy of leadership, service, and operational excellence to the senior ranks of the Texas State Guard—helping to guide the force as it strengthens readiness and expands support for missions across the state.





















Committed to Serve, Born to Sing







When Cpl. Amy Duesing of the 1st Brigade steps up to a microphone, it's more than a performance — it's a calling.

A classically trained vocalist whose background spans cathedral tours in England, musical theater, solo work at Fort Worth's Bass Performance Hall and even New York's Carnegie Hall, Duesing now brings her voice to a different stage: the Texas State Guard.

Raised in Colleyville by a choir director mother and a theater-loving father, Duesing's life has always been steeped in the arts. She studied vocal performance at Dallas Baptist University, later spending years teaching voice in North Texas schools and performing across the United States. Her musical path eventually intersected with the Guard's when a fellow performer connected her with the Texas State Guard Band.

It is not unusual to see her perform 'The Star-Spangled Banner', or 'Texas, Our Texas' at formal State Guard ceremonies, appreciation dinners, or public events involving the Texas State Guard.

"Music moves people emotionally," Duesing said, underscoring the importance of service member morale. "It makes them laugh, feel proud, and remember why they serve. I'd love to see more of it in the Guard"

When not serving on stage, Duesing is busy in the 1st Brigade Public Affairs Office — a natural fit for someone so comfortable with words and performance. She continues to advocate for increased visibility of the Guard through music. "If there's something deeper driving us," she said, "it keeps us focused on why we're here."

Outside of uniform, Duesing leads fitness classes at the YMCA and sings liturgical music at St. Francis of Assisi Catholic Church in Frisco, where she participates in a Latin Mass choir. She and her husband Cpl. Hunter Duesing — who also serves in the 1st Brigade Public Affairs Office — live in Dallas with their daughter, Charlotte.

At age 40, Duesing became a mother for the first time. "Being an older parent, I see things differently now," she said. "It's not about missed career chances. It's about passing on the values that matter — to my daughter, to my church, and to my state."

Her dream? To help build out a formal music program in the Texas State Guard. Until then, Cpl. Amy Duesing will keep serving — and singing — where she's needed most.

Tied In, Locked On: State Guard Scales the Challenge

"Up rope!" echoed through the National Guard Armory in Dallas as Bravo Company, 2nd Battalion, 1st Brigade, took on the TEEX Rescuel: Rope Awareness and Operations training, held March 28–30. Guided by a Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service (TEEX) instructor, what started as a tangle of carabiners, harnesses, and unfamiliar knots became a focused weekend of skill-building and teamwork, culminating in a capstone test.

As the first Texas State Guard group to complete this National Fire Protection Association (NFPA 1006)-based certification, soldiers gained hands-on experience in belaying, rappelling, and rescue operations. Each exercise reinforced not just technical ability but the life-saving logic behind every movement.

The final test simulated a patient rescue: hoisted from ground to rooftop via vertical trunk, transferred across levels using an Arizona Vortex trolley line, and lowered to the ground for simulated EMS transfer. It was a scenario designed to test everything they'd learned under pressure.

Leading the training was Battalion Chief Rusty Downs of the Wichita Falls Fire Department. "Better knowledge, improved rope rescue techniques, and confidence—whether on low-angle slopes or high-angle cliffs—it's a skill worth knowing," said Downs.

Private 2nd Class Tyler Arrington echoed that sentiment: "My knot skills and situational awareness have grown significantly. I'm now confident in my ability to reach, secure, and transport someone safely when it matters most."

Whether scaling embankments or hauling simulated casualties, Bravo Company proved their grit. By the end, they were certified, confident, and ready.

Master Sgt. William Grammar, senior enlisted advisor, summed it up: "My goal is to make us a more cohesive and qualified unit—equipped with a new skill set that enables us to provide an additional service to the citizens of Texas."





At the Ready

The 1st Battalion of the 1st Brigade lives up to its motto: "First In, Last Out." As the brigade's medical battalion, they are at the forefront of assessing, treating and restoring health in any emergency they encounter. Ongoing medical training ensures they are ready for any situation.

On the morning of Feb. 22, 2025, during the monthly drill at the Army National Guard Armory in Waxahachie, Capt. Melissa Roberson and Staff Sgt. Jeffrey Jones led classroom training sessions focused on essential medical procedures, including tourniquet application, cervical collar placement, CPR and backboard usage.

That afternoon, service members put their classroom learning to the test during a simulated vehicle accident scenario. The scene included realistic elements: two mannequins, two live dogs and an extension cord draped over the vehicle to simulate a live electrical wire following a collision with a power pole.

"This training pushes us beyond routine, sharpening our skills, building trust and preparing us to think critically and act safely in real-world situations," Roberson said.

Service members were tasked with assessing hazards, determining the safest method for patient extraction, managing the dogs on scene, and taking precautions to prevent further neck or spinal injuries. Using medical litters, the victims were evacuated from the scene and moved to a designated safe zone, where medical assessments were conducted under Capt. Roberson's supervision.

"The primary goal of this training was to enhance our response in a disaster setting," Roberson said. "We focused on prioritizing safety, properly triaging injuries, understanding that the loudest victim isn't always the most critical, and providing care in unfamiliar environments."

Committed to real-world readiness, the 1st Battalion stands prepared to respond when it matters most.

Message from the 2BDE Commander, Brig. Gen. Buddy Grantham

Annual Training this year has been a great experience! I am extremely proud of the officers and noncommissioned officers on staff in particular who have been working hard to develop all the training and especially the mass care scenario exercise. Plus, working with the professionals at Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service at Disaster City and using their facilities greatly added to the realism of the training.

I was very impressed by our soldiers and their performance. Especially when combined with a full-scale realistic search and rescue field problem. The medical triage in the field was exceptional. The volunteers all dressed up with their injuries, certainly helped the realism. A wonderful addition was the use of our Texas Emergency Tracking Network for full accountability of the movement and placement of people displaced during the mock exercise.

All year long, leadership has put together various training scenarios to help build up to this multifaceted, full-scale exercise at Annual Training. It really paid off.

Instead of only sitting in a classroom watching slides and reviewing photos, troops were in the field using the Texas Division of Emergency Management damage assessment tools, iSTAT and pSTAT, using apps on smartphones to report flooded roads, collapsed bridges and buildings, and other infrastructure issues and needs in real time, just as they would during an actual emergency. Programs needed to help our civilian leadership to expedite getting FEMA funds and assistance to the state and local level.

2nd Brigade Troops Train for Aeromedical Evacuation with Agency Partners



Mental Health Resources Shared at Weslaco Armory

WESLACO, Texas (May 2025) — In recognition of Mental Health Awareness Month, Yezi Trevino of the Texas Military Department Counseling Program delivered a mental health awareness briefing to members of the 1st Battalion, 3rd Brigade during their May drill at the Weslaco National Guard Armory.

The presentation emphasized the importance of mental wellness and informed soldiers about the resources available to them, including the department's counseling hotline: 512-782-5069. The hotline offers free and confidential support to all Texas Military Department service members.

"Protecting your mental health is extremely important to soldiers in general, as there continues to be a high rate of suicide (in the U.S. military)," said Maj. Sharon Moreno, medical officer for the battalion. "I would like to remind all service members that Yezi Trevino, as well as other counselors, are available and free of charge. If you have any questions, concerns, thoughts or doubts, please reach out to Yezi Trevino by dialing the counseling hotline."

The briefing served as both a reminder and a call to action for soldiers to take their mental health seriously and to utilize the support systems in place. With the increasing demands placed on service members, the Texas Military Department continues to prioritize mental health as a key component of overall readiness and resilience.

Counselors are available year-round to provide assistance on a wide range of issues, including stress, anxiety, depression and service-related challenges.





3rd Brigade Concludes Annual Training with Crisis Exercise

BROOKS COUNTY, Texas (March 2025) — The 3rd Brigade concluded its annual training (East) exercise in Brooks County, capping off a year of intensive preparation with a realistic, high-pressure simulation designed to mirror the chaos of natural disasters like hurricanes.

The event gave service members a chance to put into action the skills they have spent the past year honing. The culmination of the exercise tested participants in a simulated emergency environment, requiring fast decision-making, leadership and teamwork under stress — elements they might face in real-world disaster response missions.

"This has been a ground-up program," said Col. Ian T. Arvizo, deputy commander of the 3rd Brigade. "It has not been a top-down directed exercise. It has been from the lower troops leading from the front. We value our junior officers and our noncommissioned officers taking charge, and this has been a fantastic opportunity for them to demonstrate that skill and the trust that we've put into them. I am very proud of the work they have done."

The exercise also allowed the brigade to assess operational readiness and further strengthen the capabilities of its leadership at all levels. In a county known for its rural landscape and limited infrastructure, the training provided unique challenges that made the simulation even more realistic.

As the Texas State Guard continues to prepare for domestic emergency response missions, the 3rd Brigade's hands-on training efforts represent a vital step in ensuring that troops are prepared to lead — no matter the crisis.

Martindale Army Heliport, San Antonio – Service members from the 4th Battalion, 6th Brigade, Texas State Guard, completed Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training during Annual Training.

According to Cpt. Mary Jane Meisner, G7 OIC, the 4th Battalion is the first in the TXSG to obtain this important distinction. The 6BDE G7 shop assisted Bexar County CERT/TDEM instructors in the certification process.

CERT training equips individuals to assist during emergencies and disasters, especially when first responders are delayed. The course includes fire safety, search and rescue, disaster medical operations and team coordination.

Engineers Complete Major Projects During 6BDE Annual Training

Additional tasks included caulking and painting newly installed exterior siding on a latrine, as well as creating and installing range lane markers for the National Guard.

RECRUIT TRAINING

A Day of Training with the Recruit Training Unit

Any day on the water is a good day for the RTC Boats Instruction Unit—but what does it take to get there?

A boat team includes at least two certified coxswains and two certified crew members operating two boats. Each coxswain must first earn Basic Boat Operator Certification and then Advanced Boat Operator Certification, completing rigorous, mission-driven training.

The RTC Boats Instruction Unit is a maritime search and rescue—focused operational training program that depends on support from RTC leadership, T-4 personnel, and brigade boat units. More than just hands-on training, the unit emphasizes preparedness through equipment maintenance, collaboration, and continual instruction.

When boat teams deploy, they're responsible for more than just personnel—they maintain and operate trucks, trailers, hulls, and engines valued at over \$100,000. In October, T-4 led an engine maintenance day at Camp Mabry, bringing 14 outboard engines online with help from RTC, 2nd and 6th Brigades, and 1st Brigade support. These assets were distributed for ongoing preventative maintenance and readiness testing.

Boat teams must maintain 24-hour deployment readiness, supported by the "Always Be Training" (ABT) mindset. This includes operational and physical training, swimming, maintenance instruction, and advanced individual training.

The RTC Boats Instruction Unit has also trained Texas Army National Guard personnel for Operation Lone Star, with support from the 2nd and 3rd Brigades. TXSG boat operations have partnered with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Coast Guard, Texas Parks and Wildlife, and local agencies to support Texans statewide.



First Steps: A Day of Training with a Recruit Training Unit

The Recruit Training Units (RTUs) at each brigade are the first step in preparing new Texas State Guard members for service. Whether prior-service or new to the military, all recruits enter a three-drill, phase-based program that introduces them to Guard expectations, standards, and structure.

Each RTU prepares troops for Basic Orientation Training (BOT) through FEMA certifications, assessments, and instruction in customs and courtesies, drill and ceremony, troop leading procedures, and other foundational topics. Once completed, members attend BOT at the Regional Training Center at Camp Swift before returning to the RTU for additional professional military education and eventual assignment.

During a recent drill at the Fort Bend County Emergency Operations Center, the 2nd Brigade RTU demonstrated the strength of its training. Most trainees had only attended one drill, yet displayed strong progress. The RTU meets monthly, making every session critical. Instructors focus on effective, retention-driven training.

RTU cadre also manage recruiting packets and track each recruit's progress. At this drill, 11 new members were sworn in. Afterward, 1st Lt. Francis Ensila and CW2 Clint Robinson introduced expectations, shared program information, and led the group through their first drill and ceremony on the grinder—an impressive first showing.

RTUs play a vital role in setting the tone for success in the TXSG. The quality of instruction directly impacts the Guard's readiness and professionalism, marking the beginning of a meaningful path of service for every new recruit.

The Spirit of Service: Insights from the TXSG Motto Contest

The Texas State Guard's recent motto contest offered more than a chance to select a new guiding phrase. It provided a revealing glimpse into how service members view the Guard's mission, values and enduring identity.

Since taking command, Brig. Gen. Roger Sheridan has expressed a desire for a motto that better reflects the spirit of the modern Guard. The current motto, "Equal to the Task" — likely adopted during World War II — has long been seen as too passive for a force that exceeds expectations in training, service and field performance. In April, Sheridan invited members to propose alternatives.

With 246 submissions, clear patterns emerged. "Texas" appeared in 55 entries, underscoring strong state pride. "Ready" and "always" each appeared 32 times, highlighting the Guard's focus on preparedness and reliability.

Content analysis showed major themes of readiness (74 entries), service (35 entries) and resilience (29 entries). While tradition and heritage were less often cited in English, many entries used Latin phrases, such as Semper Parati ("Always Ready") and Fortis et Fidelis ("Brave and Faithful"), connecting the Guard to broader military traditions.

This use of Latin reflects the style of other military mottos, including the Marine Corps' Semper Fidelis ("Always Faithful"), the Coast Guard's Semper Paratus ("Always Ready") and the Army's This We'll Defend. Each motto is short, forceful and enduring — qualities reflected in many Texas State Guard submissions.

An advisory team is currently reviewing the proposals, and service members will soon vote in an online survey. The Commanding General will make the final selection, subject to approval by the Texas Adjutant General. Monitor your official email for announcements and expect further coverage here in 'The Guard Post'.

Whatever motto is ultimately chosen, it will stand on a foundation of values that remain alive in the hearts of all who serve in the Texas State Guard.

After her career in the U.S. military, Blenis applied her skills to work in the gas and oil industry. In the public sector, she would serve as an executive assistant in high-impact roles at the Texas Water Development Board, the State Comptroller's Office, the Department of Information Resources and the Office of the Governor. In each position, she built a reputation for handling executive priorities with clarity, discretion and results. Whether planning complex board meetings, managing travel logistics or designing multimedia presentations for Fortune 500 audiences, Blenis consistently delivered under pressure.

Blenis joined the Texas Military Department as a full-time staff member in 2014, bringing to her role in the State Guard both exceptional administrative acumen and a deep understanding of military protocol. She oversees scheduling, travel, personnel logistics, VIP engagements, meeting prep and ceremonial coordination with precision and discretion. From tracking critical staff taskers to orchestrating high-level briefings, her attention to detail has proven invaluable across the command structure.

Any doubts about the critical role she plays in the Texas State Guard are quickly dispatched just by counting the officers gathered around her desk each drill weekend, looking for her advice, counsel and direction. A sign above her desk reads, simply, "Choose Wisdom."

"There are three things I believe are important as a manager or as a leader: humility, integrity and loyalty," she says.

Of course, in the Texas State Guard, it doesn't hurt to have the voice and reputation of a seasoned sergeant major.

To borrow a line from a famous ad of years gone by, "When Sgt. Maj. Blenis speaks ... people listen."
