TXSG CG's Message

The Hill Country Floods of the July 4th weekend will go down as among the deadliest flood disasters in Texas history. Before I speak about our response, I ask each of you to pause and reflect on the lives lost and the families who continue to grieve in the wake of this tragedy. Their suffering is a solemn reminder of why our mission matters.

Within hours of the deluge, the Texas State Guard's Texas Emergency Operations Center (TEOC) was fielding calls from local officials and moving State Guard units directly into the areas hardest hit by the floodwaters. I am proud of the scores of service members answering the call who selflessly took weeks away from their families and their jobs to help with recovery efforts. You'll find more on their work in this newsletter.

Even as the Texas State Guard continues to demonstrate its readiness and commitment to Texas, we are undergoing one of the biggest reassessments of our force in years. We are working closely with the Texas Military Department, state agencies and key stakeholders to identify strengths and areas for improvement to identify how best we can serve our fellow Texans during emergencies statewide.

As many service members know, the Texas State Guard was formed to serve as a homeland defense force more than 80 years ago as the possibility of another 'great war' loomed in the not-so-distant future. As new global threats and security priorities emerge in the 21st century, we must ask ourselves: in a worst-case scenario, would we be prepared to take a similar front-line position today? What sort of missions might we be called upon to perform? What resources and training do we need to meet such challenges? One thing is clear: we need more Texans like you making that commitment to serve.

Among our first steps: a restructuring of recruitment to increase our ranks, raise our visibility, and streamline the process of training and assignment. We are moving quickly, and there will no doubt be more changes to come. In the meantime, I want you to know how grateful I am—and all of Texas is—for your commitment to serve.









BREAKING | NEW TXSG MOTTO ANNOUNCED

"Duty First. Texas Always.":





The Texas State Guard has a new rallying cry for the first time since World War II: "Duty First, Texas Always."

The author of the winning motto, only the second in the 84year history of the force, is Master Sgt. Kenneth Baldwin, an Army veteran with 27 years of federal service and deep Texas roots. It replaces the original motto, "Equal to the Task," whose author is unknown. Baldwin's words were selected after a Guard-wide contest, narrowed by a review panel, voted on by service members across the force, and ultimately selected by Maj. Gen. Roger O. Sheridan, Commanding General of the TXSG in coordination with the Texas Adjutant General.

For Baldwin, who retired from the Army in 2015 and joined the TXSG in January 2024, his inspiration was both personal and practical. "In the Army, 'duty' is one of our seven core values," Baldwin said. "And here in the Guard, everything we do begins with duty and ends with Texas."

Baldwin credits fellow Guard members with deepening his understanding of one of those core values: selfless service. "Anybody serving in uniform right now has no idea what selfless service is unless they're doing what the Texas State Guard does," he said. "It costs so much time, money, and commitment with no promise of compensation. I have the highest respect for the State Guard now — and I'm proud to be part of it."

That's quite a statement from a soldier with Baldwin's military experience, which includes nine deployments from Desert Storm in Iraq to Djibouti, Haiti, Honduras, and beyond. Baldwin grew up in the Dallas-Fort Worth area, the son of a Vietnam veteran and grandson of a Texas school superintendent. Today, he lives in Spring Branch, north of San Antonio, and serves as first sergeant for Basic Orientation Training in the TXSG Recruiting and Training Center.

For the record let history note that in the polling of service members, out of more than 250 submissions, a proposal authored by Pfc. Claudia Lopez of Houston ('With Texas, For Texas'), won the popular vote. "Just to be one of the finalists was an honor, already," said Lopez, who specializes in Search and Rescue in the 2nd Brigade. Lopez said her proposal was inspired by her deep love of Texas. "It's not just where we serve, it's who we are," she added.

According to the announcement of the new motto on August 4th from TXSG Headquarters, "Duty First, Texas Always...embodies the essence of our mission and commitment. Duty First reminds us that our foremost responsibility is to serve and protect the people of Texas with integrity and professionalism. Texas Always underscores our unwavering loyalty to the state we proudly serve."

The announcement included the establishment of new traditions: when a formation is called to attention, the leader will command "Duty First," and the formation will respond, "Texas Always." In addition, when passing an officer and rendering a salute, the person saluting will say, "Duty First," and the officer receiving the salute will respond, "Texas Always."

With its crisp cadence and timeless message, "Duty First, Texas Always" links the Texas State Guard's past to its future. Traditions like a motto carry the weight of history, but they also adapt to speak to the times and the people who serve. For the first time in eight decades, the TXSG has a new watchword: one born from the experience of today's citizen-soldiers and destined to be repeated, saluted, and remembered for generations to come.

Chief Warrant Officer Michael S. White Takes Top Spot in TMD's 2025 Statewide Fitness Challenge

Chief Warrant Officer (CW3) Michael S. White, procurement officer for the Texas State Guard, has proven himself the Texas Military Department's fittest competitor — and he's got the numbers to prove it.

In the 2025 Get Fit Texas Challenge, a 10-week wellness competition among Texas state agencies, White logged an extraordinary 12,277 minutes of physical activity, earning first place among all TMD participants. The challenge, which ran from January 1 to March 10, encourages employees to complete at least 150 minutes of physical activity per week for six weeks or more.

White, who lives in Thrall, Texas, far exceeded that mark, racking up 173 logged workouts that included cycling, treadmill runs, weight training, core work — and even clearing 20 acres of newly purchased land. "I always enjoy doing (the competition) because I'm always working out, so I figure I'd try to represent our State Guard and the TMD through this program," he said.

The TMD competed in the 501–1,000 employee category against 16 other agencies, placing fifth overall with more than 208,000 minutes logged. Across all 122 participating agencies statewide, more than 50,000 people joined the challenge.

For White, the win was about more than bragging rights. "As long as I can inspire one person to get more fit, that's great," he said. TMD Assistant HR Director and wellness coordinator Crystal Vazquez — herself a past top contender — praised his effort: "Mr. White got first place with 12,277 minutes: that's impressive. Next year, I'm coming for him."

Participants who met the challenge's minimums earned four hours of fitness leave — but for White, the real reward was setting the pace for the department and showing that fitness is a mission-ready asset for the Guard. A Potential Game-Changer for Education – and Recruitment

With the rising cost of a college education making headlines, Texas lawmakers have unlocked an exciting opportunity for Texas State Guard (TXSG) service members and those willing to make a commitment to serve.

House Bill 300 (HB 300), passed during the recently concluded regular session of the Texas Legislature and signed into law by Gov. Greg Abbott, doubles the Texas Armed Services Scholarship Program (TASSP) scholarship cap to \$30,000, covering the average cost of attendance at Texas public colleges. This increase provides crucial support for those pursuing higher education while encouraging a commitment to military service.


"This initiative is not only a great benefit for TXSG members but can also serve as a powerful recruitment tool," said Maj. Gen. Roger O. Sheridan, Commanding General of the Texas State Guard. "I want the word to get out about this outstanding opportunity."

To be eligible, students must meet academic standards, register with Selective Service (if applicable), and secure an appointment from a state official, such as the governor, lieutenant governor, or a state legislator. Upon enrollment in an eligible ROTC or officer commissioning program, recipients agree to complete four years of service in the Texas Military Department, including the Texas State Guard, after graduation.

For current TXSG members, this program offers a valuable opportunity to further one's education without the burden of tuition fees, while showcasing the financial and career benefits of military service.

In addition to the TASSP, the Texas Military Department offers other educational benefits for qualified individuals, including State Tuition Assistance and aid under the Hazlewood Act for veterans and their families.

Sharper, Faster, Stronger: The Texas State Guard's New Priorities

The Texas State Guard is evolving to meet the state's toughest challenges, says Maj. Gen. Roger O. Sheridan. In a recent Commander's Briefing interview with StateDefenseForce.com, Sheridan reported the Guard's authorized strength at 1,925 members—1,700 actively serving—and stressed quality over quantity as the force grows beyond its COVID-era surge.

Sheridan's top priorities include professionalizing the force and ensuring mission relevance in a changing security environment. The Guard is exploring expanded roles in cyber defense, search and rescue, and drone operations—while also considering a return to capabilities it once held, such as civil disturbance response. Although the TXSG does not currently conduct weapons training, leaders are assessing worst-case scenarios, from large-scale disasters to potential conflicts, and whether the Guard could be tasked with backfilling National Guard or Air Guard missions if those forces were deployed elsewhere.

Partnerships are central to Sheridan's vision—both within the Texas Military Department and with other state defense forces—to strengthen operations and improve mission efficiency. The Guard is also aiming to tighten deployment timelines, with a goal of mobilizing forces within 12–24 hours for critical missions.

Top 5 Takeaways from Maj. Gen. Sheridan's Briefing

- 1. **Strength & Readiness** Authorized force of 1,925 members, with 1,700 actively serving; emphasis on quality over raw numbers.
- **2. Professionalization Push** Focus on keeping the Guard relevant with advanced skills and specialized capabilities.
- **3. Emerging Missions** Exploration of expanded roles in cyber defense, search and rescue, drone operations, and potential civil disturbance response.
- **4. Worst-Case Planning** Assessing scenarios where TXSG may be asked to assume missions if National Guard or Air Guard forces are deployed elsewhere.
- **5. Rapid Deployment** Goal of a 12–24 hour response time for critical missions.

Strength in the Storm: TXSG Supports Central Texas Flood Victims

KERRVILLE, Texas — In early July 2025, Central Texas endured one of the most catastrophic floods in state history. Relentless rain swelled the Guadalupe River and surrounding waterways, unleashing flash floods that claimed more than 130 lives, forced hundreds of rescues and left communities like Kerrville devastated. Entire neighborhoods disappeared overnight, as homes, livelihoods and the sense of safety were washed away.

In the aftermath, the Texas State Guard mobilized to provide urgent assistance, from managing donation centers and assessing damage to tracking evacuees with the Emergency Tracking Network. Working alongside local, state and federal partners, they delivered stability and hope to the Hill Country.

"It's a privilege to serve alongside such a dedicated team," said 1st Lt. Madison West, officer in charge for part of her first deployment. "I am deeply honored and motivated to be part of something greater than myself."

Guard members with the 1st Brigade worked at multiple locations in Kerrville, including a central warehouse, coordinating logistics with the Incident Support Task Force. They packed clothing, food, medical kits and other essential supplies onto semi-trucks, managed traffic flow and directed volunteers. They also collected donations from the community and delivered supplies to surrounding areas.

A highlight of the mission was visits from Maj. Gen. Roger Sheridan and Texas Adjutant General Maj. Gen. Thomas Suelzer to the Kerrville warehouse, where they toured the facility, thanked service members for their dedication and praised their professionalism and hard work.

"The dedication of Texas State Guard members has been clear throughout the Guadalupe River flood response," said Pfc. Kristopher Mettlen, who had been on duty since the initial deployment. "It was an honor to serve on this mission. There was nowhere else I'd rather be than here, doing my part."

"This was the most spiritually moving and emotionally difficult mission I've ever deployed to," said Sgt. Maj. Ed Lack. "Witnessing the loss and destruction reminded me why I joined the Texas State Guard nearly 20 years ago. This was the mission for the Guard, and we had to be here from the first day to the last."

Their words reflect the courage, compassion and commitment of the Guard as they continue helping Central Texas recover.

There Is a Place for You Here: A Prior-Service Perspective on Joining the TXSG

After serving in combat arms and information operations units in both the active Army and the National Guard, I thought my time in uniform was over. Yet the desire to serve never left. What changed was my focus: I wanted to serve Texans in Texas, not deploy overseas again.

As prior service, I did not attend the resident Basic Orientation Training. Instead, I completed the training online, supplemented by a few focused drills. The goal was not to relearn military basics, but to understand how the Texas State Guard operates and how I could contribute.

New enlisted members begin by certifying as a mass care specialist (MOSQ 1330), a foundational role in emergency shelter operations. From there, paths open. In 1st Brigade, I was part of the first cohort in a new onboarding initiative. I received a briefing from the commander, participated in an interview matching my skills and interests to available roles, and was assigned a mentor to help me get oriented.

During my in-brief, Col. Thomas Mitchell Jr., our 1st Brigade commander, said, "In this organization, the junior enlisted person might be a CEO of a small company." I saw it firsthand. I also stood beside an officer with Marine jump wings and a scuba bubble. The diversity of talent and professionalism in the Texas State Guard is remarkable, prior service or not.

I came back to uniform not to relive the past, but to find new purpose. In the Texas State Guard, I found it. Whether you are a veteran or a first-time volunteer, there is a place for you here.

Suicide Intervention Officers to Support 2nd Brigade

Two Texas State Guard members in 2nd Brigade are now certified as suicide intervention officers after completing the Army's ACE — Ask, Care, Escort — suicide prevention training. They will lead training across the brigade to help service members recognize warning signs, reduce risks and connect peers with lifesaving support.

The certification followed two days of instruction led by Courtney Danner, risk reduction coordinator for the Texas Military Department. While most participants in the train-the-trainer course were members of the Texas National Guard, Danner said it was important to extend the program to the State Guard.

"This training strengthens our safety net and helps ensure no one falls through the cracks," Danner said. "It is about loyalty to our people, the duty to help them, respect for their challenges and the personal courage to step in when needed."

Chaplain Maj. John Mathews, 2nd Brigade chaplain, said the program will be critical at the unit level. "Chaplains are often called on during crises, but we can't be everywhere," Mathews said. "ACE empowers service members to be the first line of defense — to ask, to care through active listening and to escort a fellow Guardsman to help."

Service members in crisis can dial 988 to connect with the Suicide and Crisis Lifeline, which provides free, confidential support 24 hours a day. For non-crisis needs, the Texas Military Department Counseling Program offers free counseling by phone, video or in person. 2nd Brigade Leads Hurricane Readiness Exercise in Fort Bend County

RICHMOND, Texas — Guardsmen of 4th Battalion, 2nd Brigade, Texas State Guard, led a joint hurricane readiness exercise (HURREX) with all brigade battalions and the Fort Bend County Office of Homeland Security and Emergency Management on May 17, 2025.

In the large-scale drill, service members operated a Point of Distribution (POD) to hand out water and basic supplies, provided triage and emergency medical care, and established and ran a congregate shelter inside a local gymnasium. Volunteer role players allowed guardsmen to test their ability to deliver care and services in a realistic environment while integrating operations with Fort Bend County officials and the American Red Cross.

Brigade Operations Officer and former 4th Battalion Commander Lt. Col. William Carroll emphasized that practicing with local partners is critical to mission success. "It is ideal to train with the actual agencies and personnel we will be working with during an emergency to ensure smooth integration and success through familiarity with processes," Carroll said.

The exercise comes at a critical time: the state is now entering the height of hurricane season, historically the most dangerous period for Texas coastal communities. Meteorologists warn that Texas is overdue for a major hurricane, and experts stress the importance of preparing for the worst before disaster strikes.

2nd Brigade, headquartered near the Gulf Coast, is considered the "tip of the spear" for the Texas State Guard's hurricane response missions. Its location makes it the first line of support when tropical storms or hurricanes make landfall, often requiring rapid deployment to vulnerable coastal counties. The brigade's training and readiness are vital to ensuring lifesaving aid and order in the first hours of a storm's aftermath.

True to its motto, 2nd Brigade remains ad omnia parati — ready for anything.

Texas State Guard Continues Relief Efforts in Kerrville Following Severe Weather

KERRVILLE, Texas - A team of 30 service members from the 3rd Brigade arrived in Kerrville on Aug. 5 to take over operations from their 1st Brigade counterparts as part of Operation Texas Weather Response, an ongoing mission to support communities impacted by recent severe weather.

The incoming unit relieved the 1st Brigade soldiers, who had been on the ground conducting critical relief efforts and were praised for their outstanding service. The 3rd Brigade team will remain in the area until all assigned tasks are completed, and the community's immediate needs are fully addressed.

The mission, centered on Kerrville and surrounding areas, focuses on distributing food rations, hygiene products and cleaning supplies to Texans in urgent need following the storms.

"The purpose of our mission is to be a force multiplier, assisting local, county and state authorities by taking on critical support roles so they can focus their efforts where they are needed the most," said 2nd Lt. Roberto Diaz of the 3rd Battalion, 3rd Brigade.

The deployment reflects the Texas State Guard's ongoing commitment to aiding fellow Texans in times of crisis. With boots on the ground and resources in hand, the soldiers are working side by side with local partners to deliver aid swiftly and efficiently.

"Our soldiers are motivated, mission ready and proud to be here," Diaz said. "We are Texans serving Texas. It is our honor to serve."

As the weather recovery continues, the presence and support of the State Guard remain a critical asset in helping affected communities stabilize and rebuild.





3rd Brigade Trains to Save Lives in Realistic 'Stop the Bleed' Course

WESLACO, Texas - Soldiers from the 1st Battalion, 3rd Brigade, received lifesaving emergency response training during July drill at the Weslaco National Guard Armory through a hands-on Stop the Bleed course led by certified instructor Frank Stanley.

Stanley, certified through the American College of Surgeons and the Committee on Trauma, used realistic moulage techniques, such as mock injuries applied to mannequin limbs, to simulate high-pressure, real-life medical emergencies.

"I use the props because I want the training experience to be memorable," Stanley said. "To have my students get a feel for the urgency of having to stop a serious bleed."

The training is part of the battalion's ongoing efforts to enhance readiness for state emergency response missions. Participants were taught to apply tourniquets, pack wounds with gauze, and use bandages under time-sensitive conditions.

"During the training, I learned how to use combat gauze and Israeli bandages, and I had the opportunity to take part in combat medic scenarios to try to stop a bleeding wound on a prosthetic arm and leg," said Pvt. 2 Adrian Gutierrez, who took part in the course.

For Stanley, the instruction is more than just a curriculum — it's personal. "I personally have experienced the benefits of this training in my service as a volunteer firefighter with the Lamar Fire Department," he said. "The rewards I get from helping someone in need far exceed the effort it takes."

The training marks another step in preparing Guard members to respond effectively to emergencies, both on missions and at home.

AUSTIN, Texas — The Texas State Guard's 6th Brigade, including members from Headquarters and the 3rd Battalion, conducted a three-day extended drill in Austin from June 27–29, earning Community Emergency Response Team (CERT), Narcan, and Stop the Bleed certifications.

Hosted at the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, the training focused on strengthening readiness and improving community-level emergency response across Texas. Instruction led by Emergency Management Coordinator Richard Hildreth of TPWD and Capt. Meisner of the 6th Brigade included fire safety, cribbing and shoring, light search and rescue, and disaster operations. Troops practiced setting up command posts, organizing teams, and managing incidents using the Incident Command System.

On June 29, Travis County EMS instructors Capt. Daren Noak and Clinical Specialist Dan Brown trained members in Stop the Bleed and Narcan administration. Every participant, including Brigade Commander Col. Johnathan MacClements and Command Sgt. Maj. David Ocasio, completed the certification series.

The training also reinforced documentation skills, such as incident tracking and damage assessments, ensuring members are prepared to support communities.

As the drill concluded, Ocasio issued a challenge to the Texas State Guard:

"We're CERT. What about you?"

3rd Battalion Deploys in Hours to Support Flood Response

CENTRAL TEXAS — The Texas State Guard's 3rd Battalion, 6th Brigade, deployed to the Texas State Operations Center in under six hours to assist with Emergency Tracking Network operations following catastrophic flooding across Central Texas in July.

Within a day, service members were in the field conducting individual and preliminary state damage assessments across Hunt, Ingram and surrounding ranchlands. The team documented widespread destruction, mapping flooded homes, damaged infrastructure and isolated communities.

"We spoke with people who had lost neighbors and homes to the floodwaters," Sgt. Thomas said. "Neighbors would point to where families once lived or where a fence used to stand. It was devastating."

By July 9, the battalion shifted to Sandy Creek near Leander, where floodwaters had cut off entire neighborhoods. Community Emergency Response Team training, including psychological first aid, proved valuable in helping service members support survivors with discipline, courtesy and respect.

Long days, often 12 to 18 hours in intense heat, tested endurance, but morale stayed high.

"It sounds cliché, but this is why we exist: Texans serving Texans," Sgt. Thomas said. "Whether we were working search and rescue, logistics, warehouses or ETN, every task supported the mission."

The 3rd Battalion's rapid deployment and sustained operations, alongside the 4th Battalion and other partners, demonstrated the Texas State Guard's commitment to serving fellow Texans in times of crisis



Sgt. Craig Wright Recognized for Excellence

EAGLE PASS, Texas (April 5, 2025) — Command Sgt. Maj. David Ocasio, service members on Operation Lone Star, and the Texas State Guard's 4th Battalion honored Sgt. Craig Wright, as he wrapped up more than seven years of service in the Texas State Guard including extensive deployments in disaster response and border operations.

Wright joined the Guard in September 2017 and served on missions ranging from hurricane and flood relief to the COVID-19 response. From September 2021 through April 15, 2025, he was deployed to Operation Lone Star, where he served as lead NCOIC airboat operator and instructor. He also maintained and certified operators for airboats, large inflatables, Jon boats and center consoles, while training more than 250 National Guard soldiers in the boater safety course.

His achievements included maintaining more than 79 boats and 17 UTVs at a 93% operational readiness rate, erecting more than 8,000 feet of border barrier, and completing more than 75 breach repairs. He logged 250 hours as an airboat pilot in command and safely drove more than 17,800 miles during operations.

For his exceptional leadership, technical expertise and dedication to mission success, Wright was awarded the Adjutant General's Individual Award on July 8, 2025. The award was presented by 1st Lt. Marco Hernandez, company commander, 4th Battalion, during drill.

His service reflects the highest standards of the Texas State Guard: Texans serving Texans with skill, dedication and integrity.

The course was led by Jimmy Grimland, a Mercury Marine master technician with more than 30 years of experience. Grimland instructed 12 State Guard members on critical maintenance skills, including 100- and 300-hour service requirements, proper tool use and standard operating procedures.


"This course was the first of its kind to certify Texas State Guard personnel through Mercury Marine's Outboard Maintenance program," Grimland said. "It ensures service members can return to their units equipped to keep boats fully mission ready."

The training, coordinated by the T-4 shop and its personnel, provided Guard members with hands-on instruction designed to improve equipment reliability and mission readiness across the force.

Twelve service members are now certified in Mercury outboard maintenance and will apply their knowledge within their home units. The course will be offered again next year to boat company personnel from each brigade, as well as RTC and T-4.

Professional training of this caliber strengthens the Guard's ability to respond effectively during operations and ensures equipment remains at peak performance.

Cybersecurity: Why It Matters for Every Service Member

In today's world, the cyber battlefield is just as real as the one on the ground. Every click, every email, and every login is a potential target for bad actors — hackers, scammers, and even foreign adversaries — who are constantly looking for ways to exploit weaknesses and compromise the Texas State Guard's systems.

When you check your Texas State Guard email, you aren't just reading messages. You're handling communications that may include operations, readiness, and personal information about fellow service members. If a cyber threat gets through, the consequences aren't limited to your inbox — they can disrupt missions, expose sensitive data, and directly impact our ability to serve Texans in times of need.

Remember: Your Guard email is a mission-critical resource. Treat it with the same seriousness and vigilance as any other duty assignment. Just as we would never leave a gate unguarded, we cannot leave the digital door open for bad actors.

The Threats You Face

- Phishing Emails: Messages that look official but are designed to trick you into clicking a bad link or giving away your login.
- Malware & Viruses: Software hidden in attachments or downloads that can steal data or shut down your device.
- Social Engineering: Hackers pretending to be someone you trust to gain information.
- Credential Theft: If your Guard email login is compromised, attackers can impersonate you or access secure systems.

How to Protect Yourself and the Guard

- 1. Stop and Think Before You Click
- Don't click links or open attachments unless you are certain of the sender.
- · Hover over links to check the real web address.
- 2. Strong Passwords & Multi-Factor Authentication (MFA)
- Use a strong, unique password for your Guard email.
- Turn on MFA whenever it's available.
- 3. Report Suspicious Activity
- If you get a suspicious email, do not reply or click anything.
- · Report it immediately to your chain of command or IT support.
- 4. Keep Your Computer Updated
- Install updates as soon as they are available.
- Outdated systems are an open door for attackers.

Tools You Should Have

- Antivirus/Endpoint Protection: Such as Windows Defender, McAfee, or Norton.
- Firewall: Always keep your firewall enabled.
- VPN (Virtual Private Network): Use one when checking Guard email on public Wi-Fi.
- Password Manager: Helps create and store strong passwords securely.

The Bottom Line

Cybersecurity isn't just an IT problem — it's a service member responsibility. A single careless click can put Guard operations, personal information, and state security at risk. Stay alert, stay cautious, and treat your online activity with the same vigilance you bring to duty.
